Important reminders

We *all* play a role in pipeline safety and damage prevention.

CALL OR CLICK BEFORE YOU DIG



Pipelines are recognized as the safest method of transporting refined petroleum products over long distances. Although pipeline leaks are very rare, it's important to know the signs and what to do if you suspect a leak.

If you suspect a leak due to visible flow or pooling of a petroleum product, an unusual oil stain on land or the appearance of a sheen or bubbles in water, the smell of gasoline or oil, or the appearance of dead or discoloured vegetation on or near the pipeline right-of-way...

- Move to a safe location
- Call 911
- Then call our Emergency line at **1-800-361-0608** – available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week

Your safety, and that of the environment, are Trans-Northern's top priority.

Monitoring the right-of-way

Trans-Northern Pipelines Inc. (TNPI) conducts right-of-way surveillance and monitoring activities on a regular basis, year-round, to help ensure the protection of the public, the environment, and of the pipeline. Here in Alberta, the monitoring is often performed by airplane.

Surveillance and monitoring of the pipeline right-of-way helps TNPI identify conditions and activities on or nearby that could compromise safety, such as construction; land use changes; unauthorized crossings over the pipeline; unauthorized activity such as digging near the pipeline; or even erosion or loss of cover. Post-flight reports with photos are reviewed, and TNPI field services employees are dispatched to further investigate any unexpected findings.

TNPI's right-of-way surveillance and monitoring program is part of our commitment to safely operating our pipeline systems.
